The first issue of the Youth Technical
Training Program (YTTP) gathered
together 28 young people from 14
African countries to receive training
on the cassava production chain at
the Embrapa Cassava and Fruits
facilities, a partner of the Brazil
Africa Institute. The training was
conducted between October 22 and
November 17, 2017, funding by the
African Development Bank.

The first group of the program focused on agriculture as part of the Feeding Africa strategy, which seeks to develop the African continent through agriculture. The participants were selected in a partnership with the International Institute of Tropical Agriculture (IITA).

Some of the areas of the training: genetic improvement of cassava, soil management, climate changes, efficient water usage, cassava diseases and pests, economic importance of the cassava-based products, usages for the cassava powder.

In addition to the classes at Embrapa Cassava and Fruits in Cruz das Almas, the participants had trips to five more cities to train in other facilities. In Ilhéus city they visited Reniva, a public-private partnership for producing and distributing cassava seedlingsseeds seeking to achieve better quality and certification of cassava plants.


Time to action
